Outcomes from the Pupil Premium-Impact and Costings

Summary 2015-16

The Pupil Premium is funding provided to schools which is additional to main school funding. It is allocated according to the number of pupils on-roll who are:

- eligible for free school meals (FSM),
- from a service family
- Children looked after (CLA)
- adopted from care
- who have been eligible for free school meals within the past 6 years.

The pupil premium is additional funding for publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and close the gap between them and their peers.

Total fund generated through Pupil Premium for 2015-16 = £155,802

The school’s analysis of EYFS Good Level of Development data shows that the impact of the funding was:

The school’s analysis of Key Stage 1 data shows that the impact of the funding was:

- The proportion of disadvantage pupils in Year 1 that are working at the expected level in phonics screening was 78%. This was higher than the same group nationally and the difference with others nationally as continued to reduce.
- The proportion of disadvantage pupils in Y2 achieving expected standard in reading, writing and maths was higher than the same group nationally.
- In reading, writing and maths the number of disadvantage pupils below expected standard at the end of KS1 has reduced from end of EYFS.

The school's analysis of Key Stage 2 data shows that the impact of the funding was:

- The proportion of disadvantaged, middle attaining pupils at the end of KS1 in writing, attaining expected standard and above expected standard at the end of KS2 was above others pupils nationally.
- The proportion of disadvantaged, low attaining pupils at the end of KS1 in mathematics, attaining expected standard at the end of KS2 was above others pupils nationally.
